Fighting the Chill.

The last several weeks, we watched unprecedented winter weather debilitate Texas and surrounding states. Millions of people have suffered from a lack of power, water, and heat, all because of the cold. I first want to acknowledge the hardship so many people have gone through and encourage you to pray for the many residents who have been suffering. However, I also want to draw a comparison between that situation and our Christian lives.

During Holy Week, Jesus explained to his disciples what they should expect between his ascension and second coming. Wars and rumors of wars, famines and earthquakes are the signs that we should expect his return any day. Yet the real hazard Jesus says to watch out for is danger to your Christian faith. He says, "See that no one leads you astray.... Many false prophets will arise and lead many astray. And because lawlessness will be increased, the love of

many will grow cold" (Matthew 24:4, 11, 12).

Infrastructure in Texas wasn't designed to handle extended cold. Michigan pipes and power plants are. The same cold can come to both states, but the outcome is drastically different.

In our spiritual lives, the cold air is like false teaching taught by false prophets. When we hear "false prophets," we shouldn't think of weirdos in ragged robes, telling us our crops will fail if we don't sacrifice a pig to the moon. The spiritual leaders Jesus is warning us about have much more power because they're very skilled at drawing us in and leading people astray from the truth about God. They will be very convincing. They will speak to our felt needs. The danger is their teaching won't align with Scripture, God's Word, as much as they will insist it does and try to use it to defend their ideas.



The Good Shepherd Sends Shepherds ~ 75 Years of Blessings



The altar is the chief focal point of the church building. It is a table for the celebration of the Lord's Supper. Here heaven and earth are united as the body and blood of Jesus are given under the elements of bread and wine for our forgiveness and where the prayers of God's people are offered on behalf of the church and the world.

Above the altar is a wooden sculpture of Christ as a reminder of his death and resurrection. Candles on each side of the altar remind us that Christ is the light of the world

The **baptismal font** holds the water for baptism. Our baptism sets us out on a lifelong journey that is characterized by our relationship to God, our relationship to our faith community, our relationships in our commu-


nity and the wider world. Living in our baptism means living a life of repentance, faith, and growth in the practices of discipleship.

The **pulpit** is the larger stand and it is normally used for the reading of the Gospel and the sermon. The **pulpit** is placed to one side and the **altar** or communion table is in the center. Here at St. John's we have only a pulpit, but many Lutheran churches have a pulpit and a lectern.

Church **paraments** are the cloths that adorn the altar, pulpit, communion table and other parts of a church sanctuary. Along with vestments — **stoles** and other pieces of traditional clergy apparel — the paraments are changed with the church calendar, and have specific colors and symbols to highlight various seasons and festival days.

March's book recommendation: The Accidental Lutheran By Nancy Almodovar

After years in the Reformed church, Nancy began to hunger for something more. Then, snowmageddon hit in Idaho and Nancy and her husband Bobby were looking for a church they could attend closer to home. God providentially directed them to Faith Lutheran, where they soon found that their beliefs regarding the Lord's Supper aligned more closely, and they were soon to find out that baptism really does save. This is their journey out of the Dutch Reformed understanding and into Lutheran theology.

"Dr. Nancy Almodovar's The Accidental Lutheran is a must read for anyone seeking the clear, historical, orthodox, and evangelical gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Nancy makes contested doctrines within the

Nancy A. Almodovar grew up in a Pentecostal home and eventually became a Reformed Christian. During this time, Nancy earned a doctorate in philosophy and apologetics (Trinity), a masters of theology (Trinity) and a masters of Christian studies (Luther Rice Seminary), and is currently working on a Fellow at the International Academy of Apologetics and Human Rights (Strasbourg). She is also a Fellow at the university where she teaches as a professor of world religions. She is the author of over twenty books, one on the problem of evil (Faith Seeking Consolation) and one on her journey out of charismatic theology (A Modern 95: Questions for Today's Evangelicals).
